Get wheely confident: join a cycling skills course

Randwick City Council invites Randwick Hospital Campus staff to take part and develop the skills and confidence to cycle safely around our neighbourhoods.

The Randwick City Council, in partnership with the Randwick Collaboration Area partners, is providing cycling skills courses to the communities that live and work in the local Randwick area.

Throughout May, June and July the courses will offer a range of bike riding tips to develop the skills and confidence to get around Randwick and beyond by bike. They will be held on the UNSW campus as well as in parks across Randwick.



Kate Charlesworth, South Eastern Sydney Local Health District Sustainability Lead, enjoyed the course.

“We had a great time and learned a lot about how to use an e-bike,” Kate said. “It is a really a fantastic initiative that is helping our local area learn about more sustainable practices. I’d highly recommend it.”

Courses available include:

- Back on your bike sessions (bike and helmet provided)
- Confident city rider (intermediate)
- Local routes rides – get to know your local area by bike
- Maintenance and repair skills sessions
- Electric bike riding skills (bike and helmet provided)

These courses offer a great opportunity to upskill the Randwick community and promote cycling as a safe, healthy and accessible mode of transport.

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Voices from Multicultural Disability Advocacy Australia

The Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick redevelopment team, hosted a lunch and learn in April with Multicultural Disability Advocacy Australia (MDAA) - the peak body for all people in NSW with disability, with a focus on those from a culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) and non-English speaking backgrounds with disability. The workshop was presented to the project team by two disability advocacy workers.

The speakers included Rachel Lazarov, who has lived experience of disability and used to be an individual advocate at MDAA when it was established in 1994. She is now a facilitator and trains participants in the Community Voice program, a community education project of MDAA.

Maria Katrivesis has been an MDAA in house trainer for over 10 years and is a recipient of the Minister's Award of Excellence in 2015 for her significant contribution to improving the cultural competency of disability service providers across NSW.

The forum was designed to support the planning of our redevelopments in relation to accessibility and disability awareness and to educate the team on strategies for working effectively with people with disability from CALD backgrounds.

Construction update

Progress on the Integrated Acute Services Building continues well, with a number of trades ramping up works this month to work on the internal areas of the building. Alongside fit out and services, the façade of the building is progressing and is currently at level 7 and the rooftop plant room construction is also well underway. The building is expected to be fully enclosed by mid-2021.

Hospital Road works are also progressing well, with the north zone services diversions underway and piling will be commencing soon to support the future link bridge which will connect the Integrated Acute Services Building with the Prince of Wales Hospital Campus Centre.

As always, our construction team are aware of the sensitive environment that we work in and continue to make every effort to minimise construction impacts to our local community and Hospital stakeholders.

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Randwick Campus Redevelopment Questions and Answers

Will the new Sydney Children's Hospitals Stage 1 and Children's Comprehensive Cancer Centre have a physical connection to the Prince of Wales Integrated Acute Services Building?

The Randwick Campus Redevelopment team is working closely with the Sydney Children's Hospitals Network, Children's Cancer Institute and Prince of Wales Hospital to plan and design Sydney Children's Hospital Stage 1 and Australia's first Children's Comprehensive Cancer Centre to connect seamlessly to the Integrated Acute Services Building and the existing campus.

The buildings will be connected through a variety of physical links.

Works on Hospital Road are a key part of creating healthy, green and connected space.

An outdoor pedestrian deck will be built over the northern section of Hospital Road as part of the Sydney Children's Hospital Stage 1 project. This will provide safe and integrated pedestrian connectivity between new and existing health services.

The buildings will also be linked via a public link bridge joining the two buildings creating a seamless connection for shared services through out the campus.



How will the public get between the current campus and the new building?

Patients, carers and visitors will use a dedicated public link bridge on Level 0. This link bridge will connect the Barker Street Entrance to the Botany Street Entrance of the new building.

Level 0 is a level predominantly dedicated to public flow, providing seamless access between all hospitals on the campus. With clear and intuitive wayfinding, visitors will easily be able to move around and navigate the hospitals campus. Visitors will be able to use any entrance on the campus to easily access Prince of Wales Hospital, Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick, Royal Hospital for Women and Prince of Wales Private.
