The Randwick Campus Redevelopment Team kicks off 2020 with the Integrated Acute Services Building Approval



It will be a busy year ahead for the Randwick Capus Redevelopment Team in 2020 with news that the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment has approved the Integrated Acute Services Building.

The approval allows the hospital to be extended to accommodate clinical innovation and research, biomedical engineering, and research laboratories collocated directly alongside acute healthcare services.

Realised through partnership between the NSW Government and UNSW Sydney, the Integrated Acute Services Building is a transformational project that will strengthen the Randwick Hospitals Campus through bolstering direct linkages between clinicians, researchers and educators to support the rapid translation of research, innovation and education directly to patient care. This will enable better approaches to assessment, treatment planning, therapies and care coordination.

This physical and working integration model builds on 60 years of collaboration between the hospital and UNSW and will not only drive better health services and patient outcomes, but also help position the Randwick Health and Education Precinct at the forefront of health research and education internationally. In turn, attracting outstanding clinicians, health professionals and academics and generating economic benefits for the community and beyond.

The Integrated Acute Services Building's approval in late 2019 marks a significant milestone, enabling the project to keep pace with our planned opening in 2022 and supporting the team's commitment to delivering patient-focused infrastructure that will meet healthcare needs now and into the future.

Randwick Campus Redevelopment unveil the winners of the *Name the Crane* Competition

Following extensive engagement with local schools, the names have been announced for the two tower cranes recently installed to construct the new Prince of Wales Hospital Integrated Acute Services Building. The school students participated in a *Name the Crane* competition to secure their chance to win \$500 toward new books for their school.

Jonas from La Perouse Primary School suggested 'Galu' meaning 'crane' the animal in Dharawal Language. Galu is positioned at the southern end of the project site in recognition this is the closest point to the La Perouse community.



The second tower crane is named 'Koby the Courageous Crane' by Koby, a four-year-old patient at the Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick and student of the Ainsworth School, who was enthused by watching the construction activity during his ten week stay at hospital.

"The establishment of the new tower cranes is an exciting milestone for construction of the new Prince of Wales Hospital Integrated Acute Services Building, which we are on track to deliver in 2022. Community involvement has been integral to all stages of planning the hospital and I am delighted the winning names are in keeping with our connection to the community we serve," said Jennie Barry, Prince of Wales Hospital General Manager.



Competition winners and their guests were invited by the project's principal contractor Lendlease to unveil their chosen names at the construction site. Importantly, Koby and Jonas got the opportunity to issue important directions to the tower crane drivers via two-way radio!

Light rail services go live at Randwick

Another key milestone for the Randwick Health and Education Precinct's long term, integrated transport and access strategy was reached with the launch of light rail services between the Sydney CBD and Randwick in December 2019.



The light rail provides the one million patient who attend our hospitals each year, as well as the 17,000 staff and 60,000 students who work and study at the Precinct, with a reliable and frequent public transport service.

The start of the light rail's Kingsford service in the first half of 2020 followed by improvements to local bus services as well as walking and cycle routes are amongst a range of other initiatives being planned by the Randwick Campus Redevelopment team in collaboration with Precinct partners and local and State governments as part of our transport strategy.

Over time, these changes will not only transform how we travel to and around the Precinct but will deliver the critical transport infrastructure required to support our world class centre for public healthcare, research and education now, throughout expansion and into the future.

If you haven't tried Light Rail, now's the time to do so! The L2 Light Rail service offers convenient and frequent connections to and from the High Street terminus connecting to Central Station throughout the day from 5am – 1am. Simply tap your credit card or Opal card on the platform readers before and after your trip for the lowest fare.

New Year, New Transport Options

Go Randwick is your Green Travel Program, designed to increase access and travel choices for all staff at the Randwick Hospitals Campus. In 2020, we'll be offering you advice, information, new transport options and enhanced facilities to make your journey to work easier.

We've already started with the 2019 Staff Travel Census, our biggest on-site Ride2Work Day yet, our eye catching signage on Campus to help you navigate your way to Light Rail and our new Campus Maps which you can find here.

There are more transport changes continuing to happen at the Randwick Hospitals Campus this year including:

- Opening of the L3 Kingsford Light Rail Line, providing more capacity to UNSW Sydney and the local area in March
- Changes and enhancements to the Eastern Suburbs bus network (mid-year)
- More cycling facilities across campus
- Travel resources and information for new starters.
